## Pupil Premium Strategy for the Academic Year – September 2017 to July 2018

St John Bosco Catholic Primary School receives additional Pupil Premium funding from the Government for children who are known to have been eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) during the previous six years and children who have been continuously been looked after for more than six months. The additional funding is to help to close the attainment gap experienced by pupils from disadvantaged families. The purpose of this additional funding is to raise aspirations, improve progress and increase achievement for these pupils.

Resources for Forest Schools Teaching Assistants to run Forest School activities	£150 £3200	Pupils are exposed to new outdoor experiences they would not otherwise have, for example many discover new areas of the local park (Boggart Hole Clough) which they have never visited before. The majority of pupils have not been to Dovestone Reservoir or a similar environment before and visits stimulate conversations involving new language and experiences, for examples seeing birds they have not seen before. Many pupils would like the 5 weeks of session to be extended.
Specific Literacy Difficulties (SpLD) support from a specialist teacher	£9800	Pupils meet targets set by specialist intervention teacher and make good progress
Small group support at lunchtimes, including outdoor activities and lego club	£4800	Enables pupils who would otherwise find it difficult to enjoy lunchtime playtimes to be involved in fun indoor and outdoor activities and enable them to develop friendships in small group environments. Pupils are not involved in behaviour
Attendance Advisor	£12,000	<ul> <li>incidents at lunchtime.</li> <li>Attendance Advisor and headteacher meet half termly with parents whose children's attendance is causing concern. The absence rate for disadvantaged pupils was 4.54%, 0.9% lower than the previous year.</li> <li>As a result of support from our school Attendance Advisor, the persistent absence rate for disadvantaged pupils was 13.24%, significantly lower than 2016/17 (20.66%).</li> </ul>
Gifted and talented pupils	£1550	<ul> <li>Pupils in Years 5 and 6 have been given opportunities to attend writing and maths workshops at Manchester University, extending and challenging their learning and giving them high expectations for their future learning.</li> <li>Pupils in Key Stage 2 have taken part in art workshops and work has been framed and displayed in school.</li> </ul>
